



Nursery Autumn Term 2020

Welcome back to those children continuing their education in nursery and say 'hello' to new children starting this September.

We hope that you all had a safe and enjoyable holiday. This term will be dedicated to 'getting to know each other' for the children, parents and teachers.

We will be using high quality texts to engage and inspire learning across all areas of our curriculum. The theme this term is 'Into the Woods!', beginning with Goldilocks and the Three Bears. Through this engagement, the children will guide our planning and provision.



Communication and Language

Through all areas of the curriculum, children will develop their speaking, listening and attention and understanding skills.

Language development is very important as it is the basis for all learning. Extending their vocabulary provides children with a tool to express themselves.

Children will be encouraged to develop and expand their language skills in a variety of situations, both formal and informal, when playing and during structured games and activities.



Personal, Social and Emotional Development

This term is all about building relationships and developing a sense of belonging in a new environment. There will be an emphasis on turn taking and sharing, through participating in a variety of activities. The children need to be able to express and control their emotions, to develop respect and consideration for other people's needs. We will also work on your child's ability to look after themselves i.e. going to the toilet, putting on coats etc.




Physical Development

Children receive a taught session of PE each week and also have daily access to our outdoor environment, allowing their gross motor skills to be refined. The children will also develop their fine motor skills by taking part in lots of different activities such as construction toys, jigsaws, threading and use of small tools e.g. scissors. Children need to be able to manipulate and control small items to enable them to use a pencil and therefore make shapes and later, letters and numbers.



Literacy

Children have opportunities to enjoy books in the book corner, listen to stories, and participate in stories and rhymes. Activities are often based on children's responses to stories. Phonics will be introduced through group work that includes listening to and describing sounds and noises around us, developing an awareness of syllables in words, identifying rhyme and letter recognition.



Children will experience a variety of materials when mark making, including coloured sand and foam.



Mathematics

Numbers and shapes are all around us, and the children are encouraged to notice numbers and shapes and find out how we use them in everyday situations. Through play the children will have lots of opportunities to become super mathematicians by using their critical thinking skills through games, such as sorting and matching, counting quantities and recognising numerals and extending mathematical language. Children will participate in singing counting songs and problem solving during group time every day.



Understanding the World



Through all areas of the curriculum children will develop their knowledge of People and Communities, The World and Technology. Children will be encouraged to explore each area in nursery, including our outside area. Autumnal weather and the celebrations of Diwali and Christmas will also be a part of our focus.

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Expressive Arts and Design

Through all areas of the curriculum children will develop their skills by exploring and using different media and materials and by being imaginative.



Children will have the opportunity to use and explore a variety of tools and materials aimed at extending sensory experiences and developing self-expression, techniques and skills. We encourage the exploration of sound through playing musical instruments. The role play and dressing up areas encourage children to play imaginatively.
