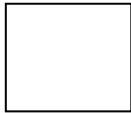

Inferences: Show not tell

Book title: Bill's New Frock
Author: Anne Fine

scared	The farmer ran in and bolted his door.	<i>So, how does this evidence show these feelings? Which words show us how that character is feeling?</i> Verbs like 'ran' show that the farmer is in a hurry and is trying to get away from someone. The phrase 'bolted the door' suggests that he is trying to keep someone out.
annoyed	Everyone knew the signs: the eyebrows knitting together over her nose; the line across her forehead deepening to furrows; her lips thinning into tightened purse strings.	Phrases like 'eyebrows knitting', 'lines deepening' and 'lips thinning' all show that she was in a bad mood and becoming quite annoyed. These are all things that happen to a person's face when they feel this way.
nervous	Everyone crept quietly around the classroom, trying to look as if they were up to something useful or sensible, or, at the very least, quiet.	Words like 'crept' and 'quietly' show that the children are trying not to make a noise. This suggests that they do not want to upset the teacher because they are worried how she will react.
angry	'SILENCE!' roared Mrs Collins. 'Go back to your places at once!'	Words like 'roared' suggest that she spoke in an angry, loud voice. Lions roar when they are really angry.

Like everyone else, Bill hoped so hard that she would go round his way first, but he was out of luck.
We can infer that Mrs Collins is angry because she doesn't just speak, she roars like a lion.	We can infer that Bill thinks that he will get the best comic if Mrs Collins goes to him first - he might even get his favourite.
